



## **StormSafe Week 20th-26th August 2012** **"Prepare now or pay later"**

**Storms can happen anywhere at anytime of the year** and are the most frequent emergency that affects Victoria.

Storms can bring torrential rain, damaging winds, large hailstones and lightning.



Storms can result in flash flooding, un roof buildings, damage trees, bring down powerlines and can pose a significant safety risk to people, animals, households and businesses.



Storms over the last few years have resulted in hundreds of millions of dollars in damage.

## **1. Storm warnings**

The Victoria State Emergency Service (SES) and the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) work together to warn the community about storms. Severe thunderstorm and severe weather warnings for Victoria can be found on the **Bureau of Meteorology** website [www.bom.gov.au](http://www.bom.gov.au).

### **Severe Thunderstorm Warnings**

While we experience many thunderstorms each year, some more intense thunderstorms are classified as severe thunderstorms, due to their potential to cause significant damage in the local area.

- Severe thunderstorms can cause damage through damaging wind gusts, large hail, tornadoes or flash flooding.
- Severe thunderstorm warnings are issued by the Bureau of Meteorology to alert communities of the threat of these more dangerous thunderstorms.

### **Severe Weather Warnings**

These warnings are issued by the Bureau of Meteorology when severe weather is expected that is not directly related to severe thunderstorms, tropical cyclones or bushfires.

- Severe weather can include: land gales, squalls, flash-flooding, dangerous surf or tides.
- Severe weather warnings are issued by the Bureau of Meteorology to alert communities to the threat of this severe weather.

### **SES Social Media warnings, NEW in 2012!**



In 2012, SES will also use Facebook and Twitter to automatically send out current emergency information. During large-scale emergencies, the SES Facebook page and Twitter feed may also include additional information.

## 2. How to stay StormSafe


There are a number of simple things that you can do to make sure you and your property stay safe during storms. Keep reading through each section below!

## 4. What to do before a storm

It's better to be StormSafe than Sorry - *You can prepare now* before a severe storm arrives:

- Develop a home or business **Emergency Plan** (see section 7 below)
- Put together an **Emergency kit**: torch, radio, spare batteries, first aid kit (see section 8 below)
- If it is safe to do so, clean your gutters, downpipes and drains to make sure they are not blocked by leaves, bird nests etc
- Make sure roofing material and gutters are in good condition
- Trim branches that overhang homes or buildings
- Tidy your yard and porch to make sure loose items do not become flying objects: outdoor furniture, shade umbrellas, children's toys, trampolines. Put them away or tie them down.

- Park your car undercover and away from trees and powerlines.



## **5. What to do during a storm**

Make sure you:

- Bring people and pets indoors. Stay away from windows.
- If outdoors, shelter away from drains, gutters, creeks and waterways. Never shelter under a tree.
- Be prepared for power outages. Stay clear of fallen powerlines: always assume they are live and dangerous
- Floodwater is dangerous – never drive, walk or ride through floodwater. Heavy rain can turn into a flood in a flash. Flash floods can be fast moving and powerful
- Floodwater is toxic – never play or swim in floodwater.

## **6. What to do after a storm**

Make sure you:

- Check your home and property for damage from the ground. Injuries happen when people fall from a ladder or roof top
- Keep clear of damaged buildings (watch out for asbestos), powerlines and trees.
- Be aware of road hazards such as floodwater, debris, fallen powerlines, damaged roads or bridges.

- Do not drive through affected areas unless it is necessary.
- Contact your insurance company as soon as possible. Make a list and take photos of damage

## **7. How to make an Emergency Plan**

Even though it's easy to think that disasters won't happen to you, emergency situations can happen anywhere, at any time. It's important to have a plan, and to know what to do in an emergency.

Experience shows that those who plan and prepare for emergencies can reduce the impact of the emergency, and can recover quicker afterwards.

Taking the time to think about emergencies and making a plan helps you to think clearly, have a greater sense of control, and make better decisions when an emergency occurs.

### **Emergency Plans**

Making an Emergency Plan for your home or business takes very little time and may help save your life and reduce property damage during an emergency. SES have created a comprehensive guide to help you create your Emergency Plan, which will guide you step-by-step through the process.

## **8. How to put together an Emergency Kit**

Your home or business emergency kit should include everything that you and your family (or the people at work) need to cope in an emergency.

SES have created a simple flyer that can help put together your own emergency kit.

### **A basic emergency kit should contain:**

- Portable radio with spare batteries
- Torch with spare batteries
- First Aid kit
- A copy of your emergency plan
- Clean drinking water (eg. bottled)
- Enough non-perishable food for three days
- Rubber and strong leather gloves
- Food and special requirements for pets



### **If an emergency occurs, add the following items to your emergency kit:**

- Important documents such as passports, birth certificates, photos and insurance papers (copies of business records for a Business kit)
- Mobile phone and charger
- Strong boots or shoes
- Medicines and prescriptions

**If you evacuate or leave for a safer area, take your emergency kit and pets with you.**
