Our new 'grown-up name' has come about as a result of changes to the way that our Shire, the Shire of Strathbogie, is now interacting with its communities when it comes to community planning. But don't worry, for all intents and purposes we will remain the 'Action Group'.

According to the Shire of Strathbogie, community planning is 'about enabling communities to identify, find solutions and implement projects that address social, environmental, health and wellbeing, infrastructure, cultural and economic goals, issues and opportunities'.

According to 'us', those of us who proudly call Longwood home (whether that's fulltime or part-time) it means thinking and talking about what we want Longwood to look and feel like into the future, writing it down and submitting it to Council for endorsement. A vision and plan that in turn can be picked up by the Shire and incorporated into their 'plans'.

But why you may ask do we want to do this?

With a Community Plan in place we can access funding through the Shire's Community Planning program to make some of the things we would like to see happen in Longwood actually happen.

We can also support other groups in our community in their quest to get funding from the Shire under things like the Community Grants Program or in their applications to other funding bodies like the State Government.

Importantly we can be a 'voice' that can talk directly to Council about things that matter to our community, to raise our concerns with them and to work together to get things done.

Our Community Plan is also an opportunity for us – anyone, any property in, around or near the town itself that identifies as being part of the 'Longwood Community' to have a vision for Longwood that we can all share and be proud of and work towards.

After all....not everyone is lucky enough to live in 'God's Own Country' - our very own 'Dirty Old Town.....Dirty Old Town.....Dirty Old Longwood Town'.

Add in the things that we value – our Community Centre, school, pub, shop and our much loved Fire Brigade and it is easy to see that there are plenty of reasons to like living in Longwood.

Did we mention how important the people are to us?



You also told us what would 'improve' Longwood.....

More things need to happen. The overwhelming priority is for the return of RV friendly 'camping' to the Recreation Reserve.

You also want more events and activities. More arts and cultural things. Walking tracks, exercise options and a solution for the BMX track.

Big picture (think Council responsibilities) things such as the quality of roads, storm water drainage, trees and lack of transport are high on the list.

Add also town beautification more generally. And for the dreamers – a supermarket, cinema, swimming pool and a train station with trains that stop!

The Plan, Plans and More Plans.....

The Shire has a top level document called the 'Strathbogie Shire 2017-2021 Council Plan' that sets out their vision to 'build flourishing communities'.

It sets out six goals:

- To enhance community health and well being
- To sustainably manage our natural and built environment
- To provide quality infrastructure
- To support and drive economic development
- To be a high performing Shire
- To advocate on behalf of the community.

We like the idea of being a 'flourishing' community. A community that is thriving, successful, healthy and doing well according to how we define it, shape it and collectively make it happen as residents working together with the Shire.

If we are able to 'align' our thinking to the goals of the Shire, then life will be much easier when we seek funding, support good ideas from groups in our community and put forward our case or point of view on whatever.

So the challenge for us is how we take what we want to see for Longwood and match it up to the broader priorities of the Shire, so we have re-worded the Shire's goals a little and come up with:

- Enhance the health and well-being of the Longwood Community
- o Sustainably care for our natural and built environment
- Have and maintain quality infrastructure
- Support economic development
- Advocate on behalf of the Longwood community
- Function as an effective Action Group

The ideas under them are deliberately broad so that we can capture any opportunities that come along during the 'life' of the Plan (that's 2017-2021 by the way).

Then once a year, we will draw -up an Action Plan of a few concrete, achievable things that collectively we can make happen and get on with doing them.

Our Plan for Longwood.....

Enhance the health and well-being of the Longwood Community

- Support community groups and activities that get us moving and shaking no matter if fast or slow, for old or young, formal or informal – things like the footy netball club, indoor bowls, playgroup and walkers – and encourage people to get involved.
- * Encourage involvement in our community groups it might be the Longwood East Landcare Group, CFA, Red Cross, Senior Citizens, Greyhound Club or even the Action Group - whatever is your thing.
- Keep our community safe continue to value our CFA and its magnificent volunteers and all that they do for our community – and encourage everyone to do their bit.
- Recognise that our community businesses do more than 'sell' or 'do' things they act as places to get together, exchange news, support each other and help a friend out – and support them.
- Ditto for the community assets that we have the Community Centre, School, Pub Paddock, and Open Spaces - and value the important role that they play in our community.
- Provide opportunities and occasions for the community to come together such as the Annual Picnic, CFA Christmas Party, Red Cross Trivia Night, ANZAC Day, Hairy Lassos @ The Pub, Working Bees, Longwood Golf Day, and the School Concert- and come up with other new ideas to get people together.
- Keep the community connected and informed through the Longwood Community Facebook Page, the Longwood Lookout in the Gazette, the Action Group Notice Board for example - so that everyone has a chance to know what's going on.

Sustainably care for our natural and built environment

- Motivate the community to take pride in how our town looks keep the Working Bees going, report issues of concern to the Shire, encourage our neighbours to do their bit - and continue the good work.
- Improve things in our little patch lighting, walking tracks, signage, plantings, town mowing and fire protection are just some things - to ensure that the town continues to be welcoming and safe for all.
- Look for ways to 'green' our world think water tanks, solar, more trees, recycling, reusing, swapping and sharing - and care and value our natural environment.

* Value those few remaining things that have links to our past as we treasure our history and heritage - like the Boer War Memorial, the old Longwood Fire Shed and the Cemetery for example - and care for, improve and maintain them.

Have and maintain quality infrastructure

- * Support the maintenance and improvement of our community assets including the Community Centre, Recreation Reserve, School and the Pub Paddock and encourage their use, including for new things.
- Update and improve those things that we already have BMX Track, Kids Playground, Community Centre Walking Track, Pub Paddock Barb-q are just some - and work towards having more and better facilities.
- Lobby for a higher standard of asset maintenance like better roads and improved storm water, the Telstra Exchange and the railway land - we might be a small town but we deserve better.
- * Dream big maybe an amphitheatre, swimming pool or a train station you don't know what just might be possible.

Support economic development

- Let RV Camping happen at the Recreation Reserve caravans, motor homes and campers are all welcome - by working with the Shire to remove the current blockages.
- Encourage the staging of events in Longwood that will bring visitors to town think events like Carriage Driving, The Beer, Wine and Cider Festival, the Waterloo Cup for Greyhounds that are already on the calendar - and look for new opportunities.
- * Support all of our local businesses in town to be profitable and thriving but particular the Pub, the Shop and the Rockery in the best way the community can.
- * Search out ways to encourage new business to town let's only be limited by imagination and never say never to exploring any idea.

Advocate on behalf of the Longwood community

- Work out the big picture things that matter most to the community thinking lack of transport, gutters and curbs and condition of roads as a starting point and others like sewerage and natural gas - and lobby to whoever we have to.
- Ensure that our 'voice' is heard by the Shire of Strathbogie on things that matter to Longwood - as best as our limited resources will allow - and celebrate any successes.

- As an Action Group provide support to other groups when they apply for funding or other things - to the Shire, State or Federal Government or other sources - that's lined up with the Community Plan.
- Talk up the town to everyone new residents, those with business ideas, campers, visitors and anyone who will listen - and try to capture any opportunities that arise.

Function as an effective Action Group

- * Sign up to the Shire of Strathbogie Charter of the Longwood Community Planning Reference Group - hold the meetings that we have to, take the Minutes we must, make sure they are distributed as they need to be - and make sure we do all the things that the guidelines require.
- * Be squeaky clean in dealing with our finances no matter where the funds come from so that everything is clear and transparent for all to see.
- * Think about how we can get others involved in the Action Group in particular younger people, new residents and those that are not here all the time making it clear that you don't have to attend meetings to get involved.
- * Leave Longwood in a better place at the end of the life of this Plan than it was before we started.

In Case You Were Wondering......What Have We Already Done?

The Longwood Action Group has been around for about eleven years and over that time it has achieved a lot of things. Actually it's the Longwood Community that has done a lot - after all we are all in this together.

Here's just a snapshot of what's happened recently:

- * Worked with the Shire to get rid of the derelict house in Hill Street
- * Held regular Working Bees to keep things looking good
- * Got some action on the future of 'The Flats'
- * Fenced the Kids Playground at the Community Centre
- * Upgraded the Pub Paddock barb-q area
- * Revived the Boer War Memorial area
- * Re-introduced the Longwood ANZAC Day Service
- * Put in new 'Welcome to Longwood Prime Lamb Country' signs
- * Built a new scoreboard for footy/stewards box for the greyhounds
- * Introduced a new tradition the Annual Longwood Picnic in the Pub Paddock.

For Anyone Who Would Like A Little More Detail.....

The Longwood Action Group set out on this Community Planning 'journey' late in 2017.

We have talked to people, gathered information and tried our best to pull it all together in this document. Then we shared it around all over again it get more thoughts and ideas to come up with the 'official' 2017-2021 Longwood Community Plan.

So if you are one of those people who like the nitty gritty, here's a quick summary of what we did:

- Talked with the Shire about the changes they were making to Action Groups and why and what we needed to do to respond.
- Made some decisions about what that meant for us and how we would go about it.
- \circ Decided to keep it simple. Two questions, three things:
 - ✓ You like about living in Longwood?
 - ✓ What we can do to 'improve' Longwood?
 - ✓ And a spot for any other comments.
- Started talking and chatting to people at the Annual Longwood Picnic think butchers paper and felt pens and people writing up ideas.
- \circ $\,$ Put out the Action Group Survey through the Shop and to any email address we had.
- Asked for ideas via the Longwood Community Noticeboard Facebook Page.
- Put it in the Longwood Lookout, talked about it at Working Bees, over at the Pub, talked at Action Group meetings or just whenever people got together.
- In the meantime, read up on the Shire's documents, went to a Community Grants meeting, talked to people in the Shire to find out 'stuff'.
- Put together a draft Plan, talked again about it at an Action Group meeting and decided we would give it a 'shot' and throw it out to anyone or everyone for comment and ideas think the same sort of way that we did with the survey.
- Considered the feedback, tweaked things where we needed to.
- Declared 'job well done' and gave it to the Shire for it to become a 'Council endorsed and supported Community Plan' for Longwood.

- The hypocrisy of a council allowing camping for the pony club and not for the public speaks volumes to me. Council and some bodies and people in the community do not want Longwood to be anything but a backward sleepy town. Fine, so be it.
- Would like to access to Longwood community centre squash court. Would like access to gym. Apparently there is only one key available to access community centre. I would like a list of contactable people who can give access to the squash court and gym. Why aren't these facilities available to Longwood residents?

- Thanks to the Action Group for wonderful work.
- I love Longwood.
- I feel the golf course park is one of Longwood's most beautiful assets. I would like more people to utilize it but there is little there to use. I suggest an exercise trail, ending or beginning with exercise equipment centres. This equipment would have to be well designed to consider Longwoods demographic (consider all ages teenagers too). There have been new advances in stationary exercise equipment to suit the aged and teenagers.
