Background and objectives



The Victorian Community Satisfaction Survey (CSS) creates a vital interface between the council and their community.

Held annually, the CSS asks the opinions of local people about the place they live, work and play and provides confidence for councils in their efforts and abilities.

Now in its twenty-fifth year, this survey provides insight into the community's views on:

- councils' overall performance, with benchmarking against State-wide and council group results
- · value for money in services and infrastructure
- · community consultation and engagement
- · decisions made in the interest of the community
- customer service, local infrastructure, facilities, services and
- overall council direction.


When coupled with previous data, the survey provides a reliable historical source of the community's views since 1998. A selection of results from the last ten years shows that councils in Victoria continue to provide services that meet the public's expectations.

Serving Victoria for 25 years

Each year the CSS data is used to develop this Statewide report which contains all of the aggregated results, analysis and data. Moreover, with 25 years of results, the CSS offers councils a long-term measure of how they are performing – essential for councils that work over the long term to provide valuable services and infrastructure to their communities.

Participation in the State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey is optional. Participating councils have various choices as to the content of the questionnaire and the sample size to be surveyed, depending on their individual strategic, financial and other considerations.





Focus areas for the next 12 months





Perceptions of Council's overall performance, value for money and overall council direction declined significantly this year and are now at their lowest levels. Perceptions of close to half of the 16 service areas evaluated have also declined significantly this year and none have shown significant improvements. This will require a concerted effort from Council to correct.

Key influences on perceptions of overall performance Community decisions is the area that has the greatest influence on overall perceptions of Council performance and is the second-lowest performing area evaluated, with perceptions declining significantly this year. It remains Council's key priority to address. The related areas of informing the community, and community consultation and engagement should also be a priority. Environmental sustainability also has a moderate influence on overall performance perceptions – Council's relatively good performance should be maintained.

Comparison to state and area grouping

Council rates significantly lower than the Small Rural group and State-wide average for Councils in three of four core metrics (customer service is the exception). For nine of the 16 service areas evaluated, Council is rated significantly lower than the Small Rural group average – on most other areas, it is rated in line with the group. Perceptions of Council's performance exceed both group averages for waste management and exceeds the Statewide average for the appearance of public areas.

Attend to roads

Perceptions of the condition of sealed local roads and the maintenance of unsealed roads have both declined for the third year in a row, significantly so this year for sealed local roads. These are among Council's lowest performing service areas. It should be a priority for Council to reverse this trend, particularly as these areas are also a key influence on overall performance perceptions. Sealed road maintenance is also the area most commonly identified as an area of improvement for Council (by 26% of residents).

DETAILED FINDINGS




The overall performance index score of 36 for Strathbogie Shire Council represents a significant 17point decline on the 2023 result. This is the lowest score recorded across the eight years of measurement (from 2015).

Strathbogie Shire Council's overall performance is rated statistically significantly lower (at the 95% confidence interval) than the average rating for councils in the Small Rural group and the State-wide average for councils (index scores of 53 and 54 respectively).

 All but two demographic and geographic cohorts report significant falls in their perceptions of overall performance. Declines of 20 index points or more are reported by residents of Mount Wombat and Honeysuckle Creek as well as men and residents aged 65 years and older.

The value for money index score of 35 for Council has fallen a significant six points. This is significantly lower than the Small Rural or State-wide average for councils (index scores of 47 and 48 respectively).

Around one in six residents (16%) rate the value for money they receive from Council in infrastructure and services as 'very good' or 'good'. Half (51%) rate Council as 'very poor' or 'poor'. A further 30% rate Council as 'average' in providing value for money.




2024 value for money (index scores)

Top performing service areas



Appearance of public areas (index score of 73) is the area where Council performed best in 2024. Perceptions of this service area have been stable over the four years that it has been measured.


- Council performs in line with the Small Rural group average and significantly higher than the Statewide average in this service area.
- Residents of Hughes Creek (index score of 66) rate Council significantly lower than average. This is the only cohort where perceptions of Council's performance on the appearance of public areas declined significantly this year.

Waste management is Council's next highest rated service area (index score of 70), achieving the highest score for this service areas since measurement began in 2019.


• Council performs significantly above both the Small Rural group and the State-wide averages here.

Art centres and libraries (index score of 68) is Council's next top performing service area.

• Residents in Seven Creeks (index score of 73) rate Council significantly higher than average on this service area, while residents from Lake Nagambie give a significantly lower than average score (61).



Low performing service areas



Council rates lowest in the areas of the maintenance of unsealed roads (index score of 32) and decisions made in the interest of the community (index score of 37).

Council rates lowest in the areas of unsealed roads (index score of 32), community decisions (index score of 37) and sealed local roads (index score of 40). The latter two measures fell significantly in 2024.

• Council rates significantly lower than State-wide and Small Rural group averages for both unsealed roads and community decisions.

Index scores for the maintenance of unsealed roads have fallen incrementally (but not significantly) every year since 2021. Results in this service area differ by location.

• Residents in Seven Creeks (index score of 40) rate unsealed roads significantly higher than average. Honeysuckle Creek residents (23) rate Council significantly lower than average. This suggests a need to focus on the Honeysuckle Creek area in the first instance.

Sealed local roads are rated at their lowest level in a decade. Here, perceptions across the locations do not differ significantly from the Council average.

 Sealed road maintenance is however most frequently identified as the area where Council needs to improve its performance (by 26% of residents). Notwithstanding this, Council rates in line with the Small Rural group average.




2024 individual service area importance (%)

Influences on perceptions of overall performance



The individual service area that has the strongest influence on the overall performance rating (based on regression analysis) is:

• Decisions made in the interest of the community.

Good communication and transparency with residents about decisions Council has made in the community's interest provides the greatest opportunity to drive up overall opinion of Council performance. Currently, this is among Council's poorer performing areas (index score of 37).

Following on from that, other key service areas with a more moderate influence on the overall performance rating include:

- The condition of sealed local roads
- Informing the community
- Environmental sustainability
- · Community consultation and engagement
- Maintenance of unsealed roads.

Looking at these key service areas only, Council is performing well on environmental sustainability (index score of 57), which is a moderate influence on the overall performance rating. Maintaining this positive result should remain a focus – but there is greater work to be done elsewhere.

In addition to Council's decision making, most in need of attention is its poorly rated performance on unsealed roads, sealed local roads, community consultation and informing the community (index scores of 32, 40, 44 and 49 respectively). Performance in these areas has a more moderate influence on overall perceptions of Council performance.

It will be important to attend to the maintenance of Council roads, and to ensure residents are kept well informed and consulted by Council on key local issues, policies and initiatives, to improve overall perceptions of performance.

Regression analysis explained



We use regression analysis to investigate which individual service areas, such as community consultation, condition of sealed local roads, etc. (the independent variables) are influencing respondent perceptions of overall council performance (the dependent variable).

In the charts that follow:

- The horizontal axis represents Council's performance index score for each individual service. Service areas appearing on the right side of the chart have a higher index score than those on the left.
- The vertical axis represents the Standardised Beta Coefficient from the multiple regression performed. This measures the contribution of each service area to the model. Service areas near the top of the chart have a greater positive effect on overall performance ratings than service areas located closer to the axis.


The regressions are shown on the following two charts.

- 1. The first chart shows the results of a regression analysis of *all* individual service areas selected by Council.
- 2. The second chart shows the results of a regression performed on a smaller set of service areas, being those with a moderate-to-strong influence on overall performance. Service areas with a weak influence on overall performance (i.e. a low Standardised Beta Coefficient) have been excluded from the analysis.

Key insights from this analysis are derived from the second chart.

Influence on overall performance: all service areas

2024 regression analysis (all service areas)




The multiple regression analysis model above (all service areas) has an R^2 value of 0.547 and adjusted R^2 value of 0.528, which means that 53% of the variance in community perceptions of overall performance can be predicted from these variables. The overall model effect was statistically significant at p = 0.0001, F = 28.93. This model should be interpreted with some caution as some data is not normally distributed and not all service areas have linear correlations.


Influence on overall performance: key service areas

The multiple regression analysis model above (reduced set of service areas) has an R^2 value of 0.538 and adjusted R^2 value of 0.531, which means that 53% of the variance in community perceptions of overall performance can be predicted from these variables. The overall model effect was statistically significant at p = 0.0001, F = 76.30.

Customer service



Contact with council and customer service

Contact with council

Two thirds of Council residents (66%) have had contact with Council in the last 12 months. Rate of contact has been relatively stable over time.

- Contact is significantly higher than average among residents aged 35 to 49 years and significantly lower among residents aged 18 to 34 years.
- The top three methods of contacting Council are telephone (40%), in person (35%) or email (26%) and remain virtually unchanged from 2023.



Among those residents who have had contact with Council, 63% provide a positive customer service rating of 'very good' or 'good', including 37% of residents who rate Council's customer service as 'very good'.

Customer service

Council's customer service index of 68 is one (not significant) point lower than 2023.

Customer service is rated in line with the State-wide and Small Rural group averages (index scores of 67 and 66 respectively).

 Residents of Honeysuckle Creek, who report a significant increase in their rate of contact (from 55% in 2023 to 73% in 2024) report the second lowest level of satisfaction with customer service (index score of 64), although this is not significantly lower than Council's average.

Nearly two thirds of residents (63%) provide a positive customer service rating of 'very good' or 'good'. Just 18% provide a rating of 'very poor' or 'poor'.


Among the three most used contact methods, customer service index scores are not significantly different from 2023.

- For contact in person or by telephone the customer service index scores are 74 and 73 respectively.
- Those contacting Council by email provide a customer service rating index score of 55. This would suggest that attention be first focused on email service interactions.



Method of contact with council









Customer service rating by method of last contact


2024 customer service rating (index score by method of last contact)

Communication

The preferred form of communication from Council about news and information and upcoming events is a Council newsletter sent via email (30%). This has overtaken the previously preferred option, a newsletter via mail, now preferred by 26% of residents.


There are different communications preferences by age group.

- For residents <u>under 50 years</u> of age there is virtually no change since 2023 in the most preferred communication methods. First preference is for a Council newsletter via email (32%), followed by social media (23%) and the third preference is for a Council newsletter via mail (19%). Preferences in this age group, after some fluctuations in previous years, have stabilised in 2024.
- For residents aged <u>50 years or older</u>, the preferred form of communication is a Council newsletter sent via mail (29%), nearly equalled by the proportion of residents who opt for a newsletter via email (28%). The options of advertising in a local newspaper or a newsletter as an insert in a local paper hold equal third place (13%).



2024 under 50s best form of communication (%)





Council direction

Council's overall direction index score has declined significantly for the third year running. The index score of 23 is a large and significant decline from last year, barely half what it was 12 months ago (45 in 2023).


• The overall direction of Council's performance is rated significantly lower than both the Small Rural group and State-wide average for councils (index scores of 44 and 45 respectively).

Perceptions of Council's overall direction declined significantly among every geographic and demographic cohort (as much as 30 index points in some instances).

• The lowest scores are from residents aged 50 to 64 years or those living in Honeysuckle Creek (index score of 16 for both).

Over the last 12 months, 30% of residents believe the direction of Council's overall performance has stayed the same, down 24 percentage points. Just 6% believe the direction has improved and the largest group (58%) believe it has deteriorated, up 32 percentage points.

In a trade-off between rates and services, 57% of residents 'definitely' or 'probably' prefer cuts in council services to keep council rates at the same level as they are now and just 18% 'definitely' or 'probably' prefer rate rises to improve local services.



Overall council direction last 12 months








2024 right / wrong direction (%)









The condition of sealed local roads in your area importance







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

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












Art centres and libraries importance




Art centres and libraries performance

















Appendix A: Index Scores

Index Scores

Many questions ask respondents to rate council performance on a five-point scale, for example, from 'very good' to 'very poor', with 'can't say' also a possible response category. To facilitate ease of reporting and comparison of results over time, starting from the 2012 survey and measured against the statewide result and the council group, an 'Index Score' has been calculated for such measures.

The Index Score is calculated and represented as a score out of 100 (on a 0 to 100 scale), with 'can't say' responses excluded from the analysis. The '% RESULT' for each scale category is multiplied by the 'INDEX FACTOR'. This produces an 'INDEX VALUE' for each category, which are then summed to produce the 'INDEX SCORE', equating to '60' in the following example.

Similarly, an Index Score has been calculated for the Core question 'Performance direction in the last 12 months', based on the following scale for each performance measure category, with 'Can't say' responses excluded from the calculation.

Appendix A: Margins of error

The sample size for the 2024 State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey for Strathbogie Shire Council was n=400. Unless otherwise noted, this is the total sample base for all reported charts and tables.

The maximum margin of error on a sample of approximately n=400 interviews is +/-4.8% at the 95% confidence level for results around 50%. Margins of error will be larger for any sub-samples. As an example, a result of 50% can be read confidently as falling midway in the range 45.2% - 54.8%.

Maximum margins of error are listed in the table below, based on a population of 9,500 people aged 18 years or over for Strathbogie Shire Council, according to ABS estimates.

- \$4 = unweighted sample count 2

The test was applied at the 95% confidence interval, so if the Z Score was greater than +/- 1.954 the scores are significantly different.

Appendix B: Survey methodology and sampling



The 2024 results are compared with previous years, as detailed below:

- 2023, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 27th January – 19th March.
- 2022, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 27th January – 24th March.
- 2021, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 28th January – 18th March.
- 2020, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 30th January – 22nd March.
- 2019, n=401 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 1st February – 30th March.
- 2018, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 1st February – 30th March.
- 2017, n= completed interviews, conducted in the period of 1st February – 30th March.
- 2016, n= completed interviews, conducted in the period of 1st February – 30th March.
- 2015, n=400 completed interviews, conducted in the period of 1st February – 30th March.

Minimum quotas of gender within age groups were applied during the fieldwork phase. Post-survey weighting was then conducted to ensure accurate representation of the age and gender profile of the Strathbogie Shire Council area. Any variation of +/-1% between individual results and net scores in this report or the detailed survey tabulations is due to rounding. In reporting, '—' denotes not mentioned and '0%' denotes mentioned by less than 1% of respondents. 'Net' scores refer to two or more response categories being combined into one category for simplicity of reporting.

This survey was conducted by Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) as a representative random probability survey of residents aged 18+ years in Strathbogie Shire Council.

Survey sample matched to the demographic profile of Strathbogie Shire Council as determined by the most recent ABS population estimates was purchased from an accredited supplier of publicly available phone records, including up to 60% mobile phone numbers to cater to the diversity of residents within Strathbogie Shire Council, particularly younger people.

A total of n=400 completed interviews were achieved in Strathbogie Shire Council. Survey fieldwork was conducted in the period of 29th January – 18th March, 2024.

Appendix B: Analysis and reporting

All participating councils are listed in the State-wide report published on the DGS website. In 2024, 62 of the 79 Councils throughout Victoria participated in this survey. For consistency of analysis and reporting across all projects, Local Government Victoria has aligned its presentation of data to use standard council groupings. Accordingly, the council reports for the community satisfaction survey provide analysis using these standard council groupings. Please note that councils participating across 2012-2024 vary slightly.

Council Groups

Strathbogie Shire Council is classified as a Small Rural council according to the following classification list:

 Metropolitan, Interface, Regional Centres, Large Rural & Small Rural.

Councils participating in the Small Rural group are:

 Alpine, Ararat, Benalla, Buloke, Central Goldfields, Gannawarra, Hepburn, Hindmarsh, Indigo, Loddon, Mansfield, Murrindindi, Northern Grampians, Pyrenees, Queenscliffe, Strathbogie, West Wimmera and Yarriambiack. Wherever appropriate, results for Strathbogie Shire Council for this 2024 State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey have been compared against other participating councils in the Small Rural group and on a state-wide basis. Please note that council groupings changed for 2015, and as such comparisons to council group results before that time can not be made within the reported charts.

Core, optional and tailored questions

Over and above necessary geographic and demographic questions required to ensure sample representativeness, a base set of questions for the 2024 State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey was designated as 'Core' and therefore compulsory inclusions for all participating Councils.

These core questions comprised:

- Overall performance last 12 months (Overall performance)
- Value for money in services and infrastructure (Value for money)
- Contact in last 12 months (Contact)
- Rating of contact (Customer service)
- Overall council direction last 12 months (Council direction)
- Community consultation and engagement (Consultation)
- Decisions made in the interest of the community (Making community decisions)
- Condition of sealed local roads (Sealed local roads)
- Waste management

Reporting of results for these core questions can always be compared against other participating councils in the council group and against all participating councils state-wide. Alternatively, some questions in the 2024 State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey were optional. Councils also had the ability to ask tailored questions specific only to their council.

Reporting

Every council that participated in the 2024 State-wide Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey receives a customised report. In addition, the State government is supplied with this State-wide summary report of the aggregate results of 'Core' and 'Optional' questions asked across all council areas surveyed, which is available at:

Appendix B: Glossary of terms

Core questions: Compulsory inclusion questions for all councils participating in the CSS.

CSS: 2024 Victorian Local Government Community Satisfaction Survey.

Council group: One of five classified groups, comprising: metropolitan, interface, regional centres, large rural and small rural.

Council group average: The average result for all participating councils in the council group.

Highest / lowest: The result described is the highest or lowest result across a particular demographic subgroup e.g. men, for the specific question being reported. Reference to the result for a demographic sub-group being the highest or lowest does not imply that it is significantly higher or lower, unless this is specifically mentioned.

Index score: A score calculated and represented as a score out of 100 (on a 0 to 100 scale). This score is sometimes reported as a figure in brackets next to the category being described, e.g. men 50+ (60).

Optional questions: Questions which councils had an option to include or not.

Percentages: Also referred to as 'detailed results', meaning the proportion of responses, expressed as a percentage.

Sample: The number of completed interviews, e.g. for a council or within a demographic sub-group.

Significantly higher / lower: The result described is significantly higher or lower than the comparison result based on a statistical significance test at the 95% confidence limit. If the result referenced is statistically higher or lower then this will be specifically mentioned, however not all significantly higher or lower results are referenced in summary reporting.

State-wide average: The average result for all participating councils in the State.

Tailored questions: Individual questions tailored by and only reported to the commissioning council.

Weighting: Weighting factors are applied to the sample for each council based on available age and gender proportions from ABS census information to ensure reported results are proportionate to the actual population of the council, rather than the achieved survey sample.

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
